## Docent doings

***Winter Wonderland.*** Ever wonder what there might be to do during the winter months for the HSDV when there are no parades to walk, no lectures to go to, no group to host at the museum, no booth to set up and man, nothing to “rummage” through and no floating through time as a spirit? Actually, the winter provides us with the wonderful opportunity to catch up quietly and calmly with several projects that have been haunting us for some time and plenty of help will be needed in various degrees and at various times. Not only will this catch us up, but it will give all of us the chance to learn some more about our museum and Dayton's history.

The first and most important project is to update our accessioning. We have had many incredible items donated to the Society that are ready to display but are not yet cataloged and listed in our inventory. We have two members working now on digitizing the hundreds of item still awaiting their turn but more help is needed with the physical looking, cleaning, and preliminary listings. This will also allow us to utilize some items for display, some to be set aside for research, and some to be added to existing displays to make them more complete, such as displays devoted to specific Dayton families.

Secondly, there is a great need to update labeling of the museum displays. We want to make clear, concise and uniform labels for all the items on display. This will give the museum a crisp and consistent look throughout and make it easier for visitors to view the displays. Ultimately, and hopefully before next spring, we will be able to rearrange some major displays as discussed in the past and complete the Docent Training Manual. We need to display more class pictures, expand the Druid Hall display, condense and update the Chinese display, remount and better display some of the maps in the back hall. The list is extensive and help will be needed.

Another, less glamorous project is creating a system for listing and keeping track of our forms and brochures so that we always have a supply of each on hand and with current information. Sounds simple, but will solve a very real ongoing problem we have had for some time: a central place to obtain current forms. Several of these projects will involve updating and being able to use a central computer system at the museum. The Society has been blessed with growth recently and we need to have our systems grow to meet the demands. Ultimately this makes for less work for members and a smoother operation all around.

To accomplish as much of this as we can throughout the winter months we will schedule several brief sessions at the museum. All types of talents will be needed. No amount of input will be too small. If you are interested in helping out with
